"I surrender, Lord, take control, I give You my body, my heart, my soul."


Her world is shattered, her past won't rest, She clutches quilt deep inside her chest. The silence screams, the nights are long, She's begging now just to belong.


Hour after hour, the battle's not won, but she clings to hope like the rising sun.

What is Step 11 in A.A.?

Step 11: Sought through prayer and meditation to improve our conscious contact with God as we understood Him, praying only for knowledge of His will for us and the power to carry that out.

This step focuses on a *daily* spiritual practice to strengthen your connection with a higher power, seeking guidance and strength for sobriety through prayer and meditation, not just as an occasional act..

- Goal of the step: develop a spiritual foundation to help guide your choices and thoughts, leading to a life of sobriety and a sense of purpose.
- Methods: daily prayer and meditation to seek knowledge of your higher power's will and the power to follow it.
- How to work the step: develop a consistent spiritual practice, such as reflecting on your day before sleep, and continuing to work on your connection with a higher power as you move forward.



What is Tradition 11 in A.A.?

The 11th Tradition of Alcoholics Anonymous (AA) states that AA's public relations policy should be based on attraction rather than promotion and that personal anonymity must be maintained at the level of press, radio, and films. This means the fellowship relies on members sharing their experiences to attract others to AA, rather than using advertising or celebrity endorsements, which could promote individuals or the organization itself. The tradition's core purpose is to protect the fellowship from sensationalism and to ensure the focus remains on recovery rather than personal fame

What is Intergroup & what can it do?

A central office or intergroup is an A.A. service office that involves partnership among groups in a community — just as A.A. groups themselves are partnerships of individuals. A central office/intergroup is established to carry out certain functions common to all the groups — functions that are best handled by a centralized office — and it is usually maintained, supervised and supported by these groups in their general interest. It exists to aid the groups in their common purpose of carrying the A.A. message to the alcoholic who still suffers

Intergroup is responsible for:

- Meeting lists and other literature
- Information exchange
- Local committees on public information
- A.A in correctional and treatment facilities
- Local A.A events
- A.A Bulletin or newsletter
- Accessibilities


As much as it was a difficult time, it was a relief to be have seen my two daughters grow through what might've been considered a nightmare four years.
